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## Braybrook

Braybrook Primary Academy have enjoyed a number of fabulous trips this term which have complemented their learning in all areas of the curriculum. We started the year with our year 5/6 residential to Kingswood, year 3 visited Flag Fen, year 4 the Sky Academy Studios, and year 5 Milton Hall. In December, year 2 visited The New Theatre to see a performance of "The Snowman" which they thoroughly enjoyed. Years 5 and 6 attended a performance of "The Nutcracker" ballet at the Royal Opera House and despite heavy traffic and a late night, a good time was had by all.

In addition to our visits, we have had a number of exciting visitors into school. Years 5 and 6 had STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) workshops. The children investigated batteries and learned about different ways to create batteries in order to power a range of electrical items such as a calculator and buzzer. The children also measured voltage and recorded their observations.



We have enjoyed music STEAM workshops in year 6 and year 3. The children created their own video game and then created their own music to accompany their video game. The children were very enthusiastic about this opportunity.

On Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> December, we were visited by Matt Jones, our education success partner from Maths Whizz, who ran a parent information session on how to use the parent portal and then held workshops for years 1-6 exploring the topic of shape.



Our "Outdoor Adventurers" in EYFS and Key Stage 1 have been working hard, both in the school and local community this term. They have been litter picking, tending to the local flower beds and planting saplings, in addition to their learning about seasons.



Just before half term, we relaunched "Passport to the World" and the children enjoyed participating in a variety of creative arts activities from around the world. Each class studied a different country and shared their learning in a whole school assembly at the end of the day. We had African drumming workshops, flag making, food tasting, singing and dancing! The children really embraced dressing up in the colours of their country's flag and National dress.



We have really enjoyed a busy run up to Christmas with the return of the Christmas Fair, Nativity and our "Christmas Around the World" carol concert. Braybrook Primary Academy wishes all our trust families a healthy and happy Christmas.



## Glebelands

It has been a very busy term at Glebelands Primary Academy and have lots of things to be celebrate as we head into Christmas. In September children returned to school with very positive attitudes to learning and they have continued to work hard ever since.

We have had some fantastic visitors in school this term, Year 4 experienced life as Egyptians, Year 3 went back to the Stone Age and Year 6 explored the theme of Crime and Punishment through the ages.

In November two members of the school council represented Glebelands in the Chatteris Remembrance Day parade and laid a poppy wreath at the war memorial. Many of our children took a part in the parade with other community groups such as Beavers, Brownies and Cubs and lots of families attended to support those parading. It was lovely to play our part within the community I think such a poignant occasion. Each year group made a poppy wreath within school and these now take pride of place in the entrance to the school.



Promoting reading for pleasure has been a priority this term and so we have bought lots of new texts to refresh the book shelves, and teachers have revamped their book corners to promote reading within the classroom. We also launched the Glebelands Picture Book Awards which involved the children choosing their favourite new picture book for a short list of 14. Each of the books were read across the school and children voted for their favourite, "The Barnabas Project" was the runaway winner across the school. ## Gorefield

We have had a wonderful positive term at Gorefield Primary Academy. We started our year with new names for our classes – geographical names – France, Zimbabwe and Samoa – during our first week children spent time getting to know their specific country and the features of it including flags.

Our children all took part in a fundraising event in early September called the Doggy Waddle. This was a sponsored dog walk around our school field. All the dogs were registered and on leads, and children and dogs were sponsored to get as many laps in as they could. We can safely say that the PTA Middlefield Bake off was a sweet success. The hall was bursting with people! So many cakes were baked for the event and Mrs Flowers our Office Administrator had the tough job of judging the cakes. We raised £195!

And EYFS and KS1 were able to have their first Nativity performance where parents were invited. 'Hooray in a manger' was a roaring success

Outdoor learning is always high on the agenda here at Middlefield and we are working towards achieving the Gold Eco Award. The children in year 4 had the mammoth task of clearing the vegetable beds. They had the tricky job of removing the sweet corn plants...just look at that determination! A few cobs were found which the chickens enjoyed as a treat. They also found some runner bean seeds when clearing away the tepee frame, the seeds will be saved for planting next year. The children take composting very seriously here at Middlefield, they enjoy being compost monitors and helping other children putting everything in the right place. Observing the children discuss plant and mini beast identification is always a highlight along with teamwork, communication, imagination, and the sense of achievement they have at the end of the session.

We hosted our second Fundraising event in early September called the Doggy Waddle. We were able to share this idea with our sister school Gorefield. Pippin attended both events and started them off. There was a great atmosphere and no arguments! We raised £903 which has been used to purchase books and some equipment for the outdoor area. We have also been so fortunate to receive £1000 donation from the Francis Hardy Trust and £2500 from a bid from the Cambridgeshire Improving Communities grant. Science at Murrow Primary Academy was recognised with our award of the PSQM outreach certification. Mrs Batchelor had led this with our teachers and our work across both Murrow and Gorefield was recognised, we are very proud of this. As part of this we continue to work with Perkins engines for our Lego League entry. This year "teams across our programs will reimagine the future of sustainable energy and power their ideas forward." Our team are well on their way to develop a playground that will produce electricity and then they will present them in January as part of the competition.



This term we were fortunate to be able to work with a project called Frog Life. A group of year 5 and 6 boys worked hard in our Woodland area, clearing out the pond and creating more bug hotels. This work meant that our younger children were able to truly enjoy their weekly trips to the Woodland, for them to explore bugs, dig in the mud, explore nature and learn independently.



As Christmas approaches, we were excited to join a Christingle service from Ely Cathedral, children heard carols and joined in with carols, as well as hearing the organ play out loud and clear.

## The Round House

It has been another busy term at The Round House! The children are really enjoying their Forest School sessions, especially learning to light fires, saw wood and make dens.



A magistrate visited Year 6 to explain the work of a magistrate, how a court works and the legal system. The children asked relevant questions to understand how crime and punishment in this country works.

KS1 visited St Neots library where they looked at all the different books on offer and were read a story by the librarian. They also walked around St Neots to identify different features of the town.

Year 3 received an archaeology workshop from The Museum of London Archaeology Team, in partnership with Highways England. They looked at artefacts, designed one of their own and held some items that had been found in the local area, including: pottery from the Roman period, arrow heads from the Stone Age, and a horses' bone from nearly 10,000 years ago.



KS1 put on a wonderful performance of 'The Inn-Spectors' which told the story of some inspectors in Bethlehem who were unhappy as a stable is no place for visitors and their newborn baby and it really is a health and safety nightmare!

The Reception children performed 'The Wriggly Nativity' - the story of the birth of baby Jesus with lots of lovely singing, excited animals, jumping lambs and lots of wriggling!



History Off the Page visited KS1 and the children discovered what life was like in a Medieval castle. The school hall was transformed into the great hall of the castle and the children made gargoyles, wrote their names using charcoal and feathers, made soap and took part in a Norman banquet.

Years 3 and 4 also enjoyed a History off the Page Ancient Egypt day where they made their own canopic jars, carved their own scarab beetles and hieroglyphs and enjoyed a celebration for Nefertiti with a feast and dancing.

8 children from Years 5 and 6 represented the school at their first Trust Swimming Gala. They competed in 25m front crawl and 25m back stroke and then a girl's and a boy's relay race. The children all swam fantastically and cheered each other on.



## Thomas Eaton

What an incredibly busy term we have had at Thomas Eaton. The children have been working hard and have been full of energy and enthusiasm.

We focused on promoting writing this term through our 'Heroes and Villains Day', where both children and staff enjoyed dressing up as their favourite heroes and villains. All children took part in a range of writing activities based around the theme, with amazing writing being produced throughout school.



Our School Council have been working hard. Once again, they decided to support the March foodbank at harvest. The children across the school were extremely generous when donating to our harvest collection and there was a huge 92.8kg weighed in at the foodbank. This is enough food for four families in a time of need and we are pleased to be able to support our local community.

Across the school we participated in Remembrance Day. The children discussed the importance of the 11<sup>th</sup> hour on the 11<sup>th</sup> day on the 11<sup>th</sup> month and the significance of the poppy and why it is worn. We took part in a two-minute silence and everyone created some art work to acknowledge the day.



Our Year 6 children thoroughly enjoyed their visit from History Off The Page which fully immersed them in life in the 1940s. The morning gave them the opportunity to experience life in school and the afternoon was an experience of shopping with ration books and old money. It was a wonderful day and highlighted how experiences like this really do bring the children's learning alive.



As we get close to the end of term, both children and staff are excited about Christmas. The Christmas celebrations were kicked off with a Christmas film night run by our PTFA which all children enjoyed. All around the school, classes are busy learning Christmas songs for their performances. We hope everyone has a wonderful Christmas and we look forward to another busy term when we return in January.



## Winhills

Winhills have had a busy Autumn term. Here are some of our highlights.

Year 4 visited Caxton Farm on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> October. They learnt lots of information about the farm and completed a range of activities. They were able to pick and try vegetables from the garden, they counted worms in the soil, they learnt about a combine harvester and they used hand mills to turn grains of wheat into flour. Not only did they complete these fantastic activities but they also buried some cotton pants. Towards the end of Spring term, some children will return to the farm and dig the pants back up. They will then be able to see how good the soil is based on what remains from the cotton pants.



We have had lots of sporting events across the term. The children have all been amazing throughout them all. The highlight was a Swimming Gala where the boys came first and the girls second in a relay race.

On Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> November, the children took part in an afternoon of experiments linked to forces. These included trying to move cans and balloons without touching them. The children had great fun and were able to tell us lots of interesting facts that they had learnt.



Year 6 visited St Neots' museum earlier in the term as part of their local history study. The children had a walk around the town learning about the local history before heading back to the museum and getting themselves locked in the police cells.

Year 4 and 5 welcomed in History off the Page. The children were transported back into a Victorian Classroom having to use chalk and a blackboard. I have never seen the children so quiet and transfixed.

The whole school took part in a Times Table Rock Wrangle. The atmosphere was amazing as the children competed to see who the fastest was. This is a great way to engage the children across school in their Times Tables. We have some very quick mathematicians.

Year 1 to 3 children took part in some zoom workshops for the Great Fire of London. This interactive workshop really helped to reinforce their learning on this topic. It was lovely to see the children all engaging with wide smiles on their faces.

It was fantastic to welcome parents back to the school for the Christmas Nativity. The children all performed amazingly and we were so proud of each of them.



## Wintringham

We have had a very busy and exciting term at Wintringham! Reception and KS1 adapted well to a last-minute change of location for their performance of 'A Wiggly Nativity' and performed wonderfully. The Pre-school children performed songs which have been videoed for the parents to watch.



Some of our children in Years 5 & 6 won a competition to design the new CALA Homes Lending Library which gives local residents access to free books. The designs were inspired by wildlife and nature.

The whole school took part in a Diwali day. One of our parents started the day with an assembly retelling the story of Rama and Sita. The children then took part in activities including making Rangoli patterns, designing and making Diwa lamps, creating lanterns and making traditional sweets called Ladu. The children also used sparklers which they were very excited about. It was a fantastic day.



KS1 learnt about 'Castles' with a 'History off the Page Day'. They practised writing their name with a quill, but had to make the ink first, made soap, medieval bracelets and medicine bags. They enjoyed a banquet which included the traditional entertainment of juggling, dancing, singing as well as learning how food was served during these banquets. The Year 3 & 4 children enjoyed their History Off the Page Ancient Egypt Day where they made canopic jars, amulets and paintings and then enjoyed role playing during a banquet.

KS2 children visited Pizza Express, where they followed a step-by-step guide to make a perfect pizza which they were able to take home at the end of the day.



Years 1 to 6 visited St Neots library for an engaging session with the librarian. They also walked around the town noticing differences between old wartime photographs and the modern day.

Wintringham held a "STEM" day, where the children designed their own glider before making it in teams. The children spent 30 minutes designing their aircrafts and making them using a straw, card and Blu Tack, testing them at regular intervals to improve their design. The children have also really enjoyed Forest School where they have lit a fire, built a den, written their Forest School name onto a wooden plaque to make a necklace, litter picking or reading in the hammock.





We have been delighted to be able to provide a wide range of professional development opportunities for our own staff and teachers from the local area this term.

For our own teachers, our Professional Development Meetings have covered the teaching of mathematics, moderating and teaching writing, and using data tracking software effectively. Key messages around the safeguarding of pupils formed the agenda of our recent INSET day.

Our wider offer of courses and network meetings have so far been attended by 227 teachers, who were from the Trust and schools in the local area. Even though many of these courses and networks remain online, it's great to have been able to continue to deliver some face-to-face training. Participants have really valued the in-person discussions, and the ability to share resources and see children's work from a range of schools.



Thank you to all the teachers who help write and facilitate courses, for their hard work and commitment to developing others.

In addition to our own courses, we have hosted and facilitated National Professional Qualifications with Best Practice Network, and the national Early Career Teacher and Mentor Programme for the local Teaching School Hub. A number of our teachers and Headteachers are currently taking part in these training programmes.



We are proud that we develop future school staff through apprenticeships and initial teacher training. Our current trainee teachers have gained confidence in the classroom on their first placement and are teaching up to 50% of the timetable under the guidance of their mentors. Their second term of training sees most of them taking up placements in another of our schools, offering the experience of a different setting and key stage. They are all looking forward to learning alternative approaches to lesson delivery and curriculum, and seeing a different school in action.
