The children listened attentively to a detailed talk about birds of prey, before meeting 5 different types of owls and raptors. The children sat in silence and awe, as they watched the birds in flight around and across the school hall. They then made the most of getting hands on with the birds, holding, handling and stroking each in turn. The children loved being up close and personal with these incredible creatures — a truly incredible experience and an opportunity not to be missed!

Rock Star Maths Day

Leverington Primary Academy started the term with a whole school 'Rock Star Maths Day' to relaunch the use of Times Tables Rockstars. All children (and staff!) dressed in their best rock outfits and took part in various Maths and times table challenges throughout the day. This also launched the start of our weekly Times Tables assembly, helping children to become fluent in recall of number facts and times tables.

Creative Assembly

Every month, our children enjoy completing a variety of creative homework tasks linked to their topics. We celebrated the fantastic things they had made at a creative assembly, organised and managed by our Key Stage 2 Arts Ambassadors with Mrs Pooley, our Arts Lead teacher. Homework was displayed and the doors were opened to parents to share everyone's achievements. The creative ideas included vegetable art, paper maché Easter eggs, pirate



maps, Roman shields and a 'Great British Bake Off' competition.

Down on the Farm

Our Reception children have thoroughly enjoyed their 'Down on the Farm' topic this term. They were very excited to have some eggs delivered to the class and watched them hatch. They found out about the life cycle of a chick and even got to hold the chicks too. To finish their topic, the children had a fantastic day out at Church Farm, where they got to feed the lambs and experience a ride on a tractor too!



This term, our Year 4 children have been working with 20Twenty Productions on the 'Bits and Bytes' project. Children spent weeks working together developing

interpersonal skills and basic robotic skills. They were lucky enough to attend the final at March Town Hall on Friday 15^{th} March, where they finished 3^{rd} out of 47 schools – a fantastic achievement!



Year 6 have been enjoying the topic of 'Prisoners and Punishment' this term. As part of their topic, they were visited by the local PCSOs who staged a crime scene in our hall. Children had to give a description of the offender and collect evidence from the crime scene to help the officers convict the perpetrator.



They also made copies of their fingerprints and blew them up on to balloons to see them enlarged. They then visited Lincoln Castle, where they played an



escape game in the prison cells, completed their chores including laundry, picking oakum and handwriting, before visiting the chapel for a sermon. The children enjoyed listening to some gruesome stories of hanging, escapes and poisonings before a windswept walk along the castle wall!


Following on from this - and again a project that involved team work and robots - Year 3 and 4 continued to work on their **Bits and Bytes** Project. The two year groups visited the Leicester Space centre, all funded by this project. They then came back to school and in teams took part in a competition. The winning team went on to represent the school in the regional final where they came second. Two of our children have been selected, due to their behaviour and sportsmanship, to go on a trip to Harry Potter Studios. Well done to all who took part.

Our classes have all been very fortunate to experience some amazing trips. These trips were designed to provide children with real life experiences - ones that can then inform their writing and creative work back at school. The visits have included: Cadbury World linking to their Charlie and the Chocolate Factory topic; Peterborough Museum to investigate Victorian medicine, and visits to two local farms. At one the children learned about cows and grain being grown, and at the other about vegetable cultivation - potatoes and leeks were picked and the children then ate the soup they made.

was developed. Competition day came and the team were incredible. There were ten other schools, including secondary pupils taking part. They worked together to present their ideas to the judges, explained their ideas to other competitors, interviewed other competitors and finally took part in four rounds of Robot wars. The team came away victorious in two categories — Best Project Award and Winners of the Knock out Phase.


in Year 1, Leila in Year 2, Amelia in Year 3, Brendan in Year 4, Mia in Year 5 and Tilly in Year 6.

Year 1 and 2 Bosch Workshop

On Wednesday 13th March, pupils from Winhills Primary Academy were visited by members of Bosch Rexroth for a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) morning. Jim Marlin and Dave Webb spent time with children from Years 1 and 2, where they looked at how the children can use forces to move objects. The focus of their session was using air as a force to push objects (linking to pneumatics) and the children were able to fire air propelled rockets at targets. Children in Key Stage 2 will be getting the opportunity to work with Bosch over the next term.



Year 3 and 4 Fitzwilliam Museum Visit

A couple of weeks ago, Year 3 and 4 visited the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge as part of their learning all about Ancient Egypt. They had a wonderful learning experience with the members of staff at the museum. They were able to look at some amazing artefacts, learned about the practice of mummification, and even had the chance to design and paint their own hieroglyphs on papyrus paper.



Year 4 Residential Trip to Grafham Water

Earlier this half term, Year 4 had their residential to Grafham Water. The children had a wonderful time and really developed their team building skills. They took part in a range of activities such as rock climbing, orienteering, sailing and biking. They all gave every activity a go and pushed themselves, even if they felt nervous. New Building

The Reception children in Wintringham Primary Academy have now moved into their new classroom and have settled in really well. The classroom is lovely and bright and filled with brand new resources and equipment. The children do however still join The Round House for some of their work, assemblies and









The children have really enjoyed their outdoor learning this term. They have sat on the logs surrounding the fire pit and Miss Abbott went through the rules that the children will need to follow when the fire has been lit. The children then learnt about how a fire is made and that it needs oxygen, a heat source and fuel for it to light. They then watched Miss Abbott use a flint to start the fire. Once the flames had gone down, the children toasted marshmallows over the fire. The children also learnt which part of the fire was best to toast their marshmallows. Once they had been toasted, the children blew on them to cool them down before they ate them up, they were a bit sticky but very yummy! At the end, the children used the charcoal from the fire to draw pictures on the trees in the field.

Dance

All the children have enjoyed their dance lessons this term with Miss Jones. They had to

follow a series of instructions in order to learn a short routine. In small groups, the children performed their routine to the rest of the class and then gave each other feedback. At the end of the lesson, the children enjoyed playing a game of musical statues. The children really enjoyed it and are already looking forward to their next dance lesson.

The children really enjoyed their first Wintringham pancake race on Shrove Tuesday. They also learnt how to toss their pancakes and then enjoyed eating some pancakes that had not fallen on the floor!

Our full programme of courses has continued to run this term, with 558 participants attending so far this academic year. We have developed and started to deliver two new training programmes: 'New to the LGB' which explains the roles and responsibilities of members of the Local Governing Body (LGB), and 'Early Career Development' for teachers in their second to fifth year of teaching, focusing on pedagogy and career pathways.

We continue to be a partner with Best Practice Network, who delivers Higher Level Teaching Assistant (HLTA) preparation and assessment training. The next training will be taking place in May and



June. Following the success of Teaching Assistant development meetings last year, we have re-launched these in each hub enabling Teaching Assistants to share good practice and develop their knowledge further.

Applications for School Direct trainees for the 2019-20 academic year are now being accepted, and interviews have started to take place.
